



## Pin Oak *Quarks palustris* 01-33

*This member of the red oak group grows 70'-80' tall and 2'-3' in diameter in the open. The crown is pyramidal and profusely branched. The leaves are typically oak shaped with deep bristle tipped lobes characteristic of the red oaks. It bears brown acorns (nuts) with mahogany-red streaks. Occurs from Connecticut, west to Iowa and Nebraska, including the Chesapeake Bay region, and into central North Carolina in the United States. Inhabits both moist bottomland soils and moist uplands. It tolerates heavy-textured clay soils.*
