Think of winter and the plants in this# border come to mind: cone-shaped "living Christmas trees" such as Blue Spruce, bright Berries Jubilee Holly and Cranberry Cotoneaster, and-in mild climates- Yuletide Camellia with dazzling red blooms that unfurl in time for the holidays. The low, mounding Dwarf Mugo Pines flanking a boulder provide a rugged, informal edging. The holly, cotoneaster and camellia, once mature, can provide plenty of snippets for making wreaths. If a nearby wall has an electrical outlet, embellish your tree with tiny white outdoor lights for the holidays. In warmer zones, substitute the Fat Albert Colorado Blue Spruce with Blue Point Juniper (*Juniperus chinensis* 'Blue Point'). The Yuletide Camellia grows best in cold zones 7-10. In colder zones, plant a second Berries Jubilee Holly instead.
